

by Rick Bragg (5 copies)

After Rick Bragg won the Pulitzer Prize in 1996, he wrote this memoir and tribute to his mother who made many sacrifices for him and his brothers in the dirt poor south.

by Lorna Landvik (10 copies)
The women of Freesia Court are fully convinced that a cup of coffee, delicious desserts and a strong shoulder can fix anything. Throughout the years their book club has served as an outlet for friends to discuss life as well as books.

#### **Balzac and the Little Chinese Seamstress**

by Dai Sijie (8 copies)

by Kim Edwards (12 copies)
Dr. David Henry delivers his twins during a terrible snowstorm. After realizing his daughter is born with Down syndrome, he decides to protect his wife and gives the child to his nurse, who secretly decides to raise her. The book spans twenty five years from the children's births to adulthood.

by Alexander McCall Smith (5 copies) Precious Ramotswe goes against all convention in Botswana and sells her late father's cattle to get money to set up her detective agency.

#### The Painted Veil

by W. Somerset Maugham (10 copies) Kitty Fane's affair with Assistant Colonial Secretary Townsend is interrupted when her vengeful bacteriologist husband takes her from Hong Kong to work in a cholera epidemic.

# **The Plot Against America**

by Philip Roth (10 copies)
In this book of alternative history, Charles
Lindbergh defeats Franklin Roosevelt in
the 1940 presidential election. Lindbergh
negotiates an accord with Adolf Hitler

and accepts his conquest of Europe and anti-Semitic policies. This novel is both appropriate and timeless to the belief "it can't happen here."

#### The Secret Life of Bees

by Sue Monk Kidd (12 copies)
Fourteen-year-old Lily Owens and her
African-American nanny Rosaleen escape
their small town after a racial incident
and find themselves welcomed by the
Calendar sisters, three women raising
bees in the south.

#### **Suite Francaise**

by Irene Nemirovsky (10 copies)
This novel is in two parts. The first part
"Storm in June" is set during the 1940
chaotic exodus from Paris. The second
part "Dolce" is set in a German-occupied
village full of resentment, resistance, and
collaboration.

# **Water for Elephants**

by Sara Gruen (5 copies)
This is the story of Jacob Jankowski's life with the circus. After his parents die in a car crash, leaving Jacob penniless, he drops out of veterinary school and joins the circus.

### Year of Wonders: a Novel of the Plague

by Geraldine Brooks (11 copies)
When the bubonic plague erupts in
the small town of Eyam in Derbyshire,
England in 1665, the rector of the
community calls upon the town members
to quarantine themselves rather than risk
spreading the disease.
