- As of October 24th, Google reported the Library has had a total of 56 reviews, with a 4.4 rating. In the last 30 days, Google reported we had 68K views of photos of the library (interior & exterior), 509 requests for directions, 180 calls from the Library's Google page, and 609 website visits via Google Search. We had 3,515 views of our Google profile which lists our hours and upcoming programs.
- We have continued with hybrid programming, broadcasting to Facebook Live, Zoom, YouTube and our Facebook page. We continue to test new technology to make hybrid programming more enjoyable and easier to access. We have received a lot of positive feedback about our hybrid programming.
- Handled online program sign-ups, coordinated Zoom & YouTube programming, and statistics.
- Listed all Adult & Youth Fall programs on our Google profile and on our Facebook page.
- Rebuilt 1 Ask Me Desk PC and 1 PC in the back office of YS.
- Winterized the outdoor cameras; cameras were cleaned up, re-painted and seals were checked.
- PAC stations were switched back to the "Classic Catalog" look.
- Patron & staffed desk PCs were switched away from the protective plastic covers.
- We've begun updating to Windows 22H2, numerous security upgrades are available with this version.
- Several phones were rebuilt after a Server Infrastructure upgrade was done with the phone company.

- A Reference Area camera was upgraded.
- Staff & patron-use PCs were updated as indicated by the IT update schedule.
- Assisted / trained several staff & patrons with the Library's new App.
