by Julia Claiborne Johnson

The long awaited second novel from the author of *Be Frank with Me*, Julia Claiborne Johnson's *Better Luck Next Time* soars. In it, a former Yale student takes a job at a Depression-era Reno divorce ranch and finds his life upended by two women with very different histories.

Conjure Women by Afi Atakora

A mother and daughter with a shared talent for healing and the conjuring of curses are at the heart of this magnificently written first novel, which brings the world of the South both before and after the Civil War to brilliant life.

Dear Edward by Ann Napolotino

One summer morning, twelve-year-old Edward Adler, his family, and 183 other passengers board a flight in Newark headed for Los Angeles. Halfway across the country, the plane crashes. Edward is the sole survivor. A transcendent coming-of-age story, a multidimensional portrait of an unforgettable cast of characters, and a breathtaking illustration of all the ways a broken heart learns to love again.

The author writes with wit and heart a most unique story of parental love and lives reborn.


movies

Tenet Christopher Nolan roars back into action with Tenet, a twisty, time-bending thriller that keeps audiences riveted, with a stellar cast led by John David Washington.

The Assistant Jane, a recent college graduate and aspiring film producer, just landed her dream job as a junior assistant to a powerful entertainment mogul. Her day is much like any other assistant. But as Jane follows her daily routine, she grows increasingly aware of the abuse that insidiously colors her workday, an accumulation of degradations against which she decides to take a stand.

Roma With monumental black-and-white cinematography, this is Alfonso Cuaron's personal film about his childhood in 1970s Mexico City, seen through the eyes of an indigenous Mexican domestic worker, as the family struggles with personal and political upheavals. A labor of love, this film has few parallels in the history of cinema.
